Prime Directive is the new Classic Trek hardback and is now available in book form and on audio, read by James


"Scotty" Doohan.

DOING THE CON THING AGAIN BY PAT HEINSKE

STARDATE 9008.01 - We are on our way home from yet another convention. This one, in Oshkosh, Wisconsin. But, this one was different. This was the Annual Experimental Aircraft Association (E.A.A.) Fly-in Convention. Every year, around the end of July, thousands of people flock to Wittman Regional Airport at Oshkosh to show off their airplanes (if they have them), go to seminars and shows about aviation, and, most of all, see aircraft of absolutely every kind ever built. This year, there was an estimated 7-day attendance total of over 800,000 people and over 15,000 aircraft, including those that landed at nearby Fond Du Lac and Appleton Airports to attend the event. Also in attendance were 1,884 aircraft that were entered for judging in 10 different from custom categories, ranging homebuilts, to WWII warbirds. A few of the highlights were 6 aircraft commemorating the 50th anniversary of the Battle of Britain which flew in daily dogfight demonstrations. An actual Russian MIG 21 fighter, NASA's Grumman x-29 - a prototype fighter so inherently unstable (to greatly improve maneuverability) that it needs 3 onboard computer systems to control it in the sky, the only flying Lockheed Super Constellation in the world, the Concorde, a B-1B Bomber, and the highlight of the convention - the Lockheed F-117A Stealth Fighter - its first public unveiling since it was put into service some 10 years ago.

During the 4 days and 3 nights my dad and I stayed at the convention, I managed to take approximately 360 photographs and never even came close to capturing a fraction of the activity on film. If you like aircraft of any kind, Oshkosh, Wisconsin is the place to be.

Next issue, I'll be reporting on my trip to OktoberTrek in Hunt Valley, Maryland. Until then, see you in the Holodeck!

HUBBLE TELESCOPE UPDATE

The exact nature of the telescope's focusing problem is now known. The problem lies in the shape of the primary mirror, not the secondary mirror as previously reported. The primary mirror has been overly ground into a hyperbolic shape who's curve is flatter than intended. The over-grinding is more severe at the mirror's edges, than at the center.

This incorrect shape is the result of an improperly constructed optical measuring device, used to measure the shape of the mirror. The instrument's shape was recently discovered to be one millimeter off spec.

NASA's explanation that testing the primary/secondary mirror pair would have been too expensive has been proven false. Even the simplest test, like those conducted by amateur astronomers, would have detected the profound misshape of the primary mirror.

Since the mirror's center is closer to the specified shape, one suggested solution was to place a cover over the telescope's aperture opening, with a hole that would mask the edges of the primary mirror. This plan has been rejected, since it has been determined that the additional sharpening of the focus would be greatly offset by the dimming of the image.

Scientists at the Space Telescope Institute in Greenbelt, MD have always planned to retrofit the Hubble with new instruments after a few years in space. The current plan is to fit each of the Hubble's five major instruments with supplementary lenses to compensate for the focusing errors of the main optics. This retrofit would take place in space, or perhaps in the cargo bay of the Space Shuttle. This repair mission is currently scheduled for 1993.

Only about ten percent of the research originally scheduled for the HST can still be accomplished. Most of this work involved observation in the infrared spectrum.

In addition to the focusing problem, there have been many other problems and malfunctions that mission controllers and scientists are forced to 'work around'. Each malfunction reduces the quality or duration of telescope observations.

Even before launch, the telescope was launched at the wrong altitude. The HST was designed in the 1970's to be deployed far from Earth, in an 800 mile orbit, by a heavy booster rocket, or by a 'space tug'. It was to have been serviced twice a year from the Space Station Freedom. Instead it was launched to a 350 mile orbit by the Space Shuttle. The Earth itself now blocks fifty percent of the telescope's view.

The latest problem to come to light is an unfortunate tendency of the telescope to 'flap' its solar collector wings as the telescope approaches the terminator, the border between night and day. This behavior occurs twice per orbit, and causes the telescope to lose its lock on the object being observed. This reduces the observing time of the telescope by one third.
