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BOOK REVIEWS DARK MIRROR

This book is a continuation of the mirror universe theme, a view through the mirror in Next Gen time, deliberately instigated this time by the alternate universe's Starfleet. If you can ignore some of the faulty logic inherent in the whole concept (i.e., any universe this different from our own would most surely be more different. It is extremely unlikely that the same people would even be born, let alone wind up in the same positions, more or less, in each universe. For example, without that attack on Kittomer, how does Worf wind up in Starfleet?) However, if you accept the illogic in the premise, then the story is quite compelling. Diane Duane's books are often overburdened with detail. This one suffers less from that problem than the other's of hers that I have read. A few tidbits: on the alternate universe Enterprise, the one person everyone fears is "Counselor" Troi, Chief of Security. And I know some of you (Sickos) will be pleased to see Wesley Crusher subjected to the Agony Booth. In conclusion, this is a well written story, and I recommend it highly.

On an unspecified stardate, four officers of the starship U.S.S. Enterprise: NCC-1701 became the victims of a freak mishap which took them across a dimensional barrier... and into a universe which could only be described as a perverse parody of our own. In place of a peaceful. democratically-oriented Federation, a savage, brutal Empire dominated much of the know Galaxy by force and fear. The transposed officers felt like a quartet of Dr. Jekylls in a world full of Mr. Hydes. Through an engineering miracle, the foursome were able to escape that mirror universe, but just barely. Though unable to forget their experiences there, they comforted themselves with the knowledge that such an incident would not happen again.

So they believed.

Now, nearly a century later, the twisted science of that Empire has opened a gateway into our universe. The Enterprise-D of that universe has come through that gate, its crew intent upon infiltrating the Federation... and shattering it from within. Can the crew of the U.S.S. Enterprise compete in this

deadly game of subterfuge, especially when the enemy is... themselves?

In 1813, Oliver Perry, upon the occasion of his victory over a British fleet on Lake Erie, uttered these words: "We have met the enemy, and they are ours." In the late 1960's, the long-running comic strip "Pogo" coined its own unique spin on Perry's quote: "We have met the enemy, and it is us!" In the case of this novel, the quote should be "We have met the enemy, and it is us... or is it?"

Once again, Ireland's foremost STAR TREK authoress has outdone herself, using her unique combination of astronomical fact and science fiction to capture the spirit and soul of STAR TREK as no one else can. Danger lurks at every turn as her words bring the decadent and oppressive atmosphere of Jerome Bixby's Empire to life with a chill clarity of image that evokes a sense of "you are there". She does herself proud with her detailed and insightful focus on the interplay and relationships among the Enterprise officers and crew, as well as their counterparts aboard the LS.S. Picard's Enterprise. Captain counterpart, in particular, is revealed to be twice the monster that Kirk's counterpart

All in all, Dark Mirror is a masterwork, crafted with the liquid gift of language and meticulous attention to detail which is Diane Duane's signature. It also keeps you reading right to the last page, another of her signatures.

COLLECTOR'S REPORT

As the end of the year approaches, we finally have some new releases, as well as some news on some upcoming model kits

The long-awaited Deep Space Nine Runabout finally showed up. It was originally due out in August, but didn't arrive until late November. The kit actually has a scale on it, which is unusual for a "non-real item". It is listed as 1/72 scale, and measures in at over 12" long. It includes a detachable "Deep Space Sensor Array", a sort of module that attaches above the rear hull. I haven't seen it in the show, but I'm not all that current in my episodes yet. There are decals for the Rio Grande, the Yangtzee Kiang, and the Ganges, but no markings for the Oronoco. The retail price is \$18.50.

Screamin' Models recently released another of their Star Wars vinyl kits. This time it's a Stormtrooper in 1/4 scale. As I haven't seen one yet, I'll read you the release blurb. "As the seventh release in their popular Science Fiction Series, Screamin's Stormtrooper model kit captures the detailing of these hitmen of the evil Galactic Empire. Clad in a white

armored spacesuit with blaster rifle ready, the assembled figure stands over 18" tall." The retail price on this meany is \$67.95.

Two new figures have come out from Geometrics. Now offered in 12" vinyl are Lieutenant Commander Geordi La Forge and Counselor Deanna Troi. No other particulars (such as uniform style) are available. The price is supposed to be \$60.00 each. These two continue Geometrics NG line, which already includes Captain Jean-Luc Picard, Lieutenant Commander Data, and Lieutenant Worf.

There are several new Star Trek models supposedly coming out in 1994 from AMT/Ertl (we all know how release schedules work, so I won't guarantee any of these actually arriving until I have one in my hot little hands). They are (in no particular order):

• Fiber Optic USS Enterprise - This is a model of the NCC1701D that is supposedly in scale with the Enterprise model kits, but don't quote me on that. The unique feature of this is that it will allegedly come with all the lights and fiber

optics to illuminate the engines and "hundreds of windows". It is also supposed to come with a battery powered drill to drill the holes in the hull for the fiber optics. The price on this is to be \$48.75.

 USS Excelsior - They are finally coming out with everybody's favorite space guppy. There is no word on the scale, only that it is in proportion with the model used in the show. The price is supposed to be \$19.00.

 Deep Space Nine Station - A model of the actual station. It should be about 18" in diameter when finished. Retail should be \$18.75.

• Figures - 12" tall vinyl figures of Capt. James T. Kirk, Dr. McCoy, and Mr. Scott come complete with choices of limbs for varied poses. They will come with transporter pad bases. It is unclear what uniform these figures will be wearing, although the catalog has stills of the crew members from the original series. They are each supposed to cost \$29.50.

CHECK LIST FOR TRANSPORT VEHICLES

I. WARP DRIVE SYSTEM

- A. INSPECT WARP DRIVE COOLANT CONDITION, AND LEVEL IN THE COOLANT HEAT TRANSFER CHAMBER: [RADIATOR] AND FILL AS NECESSARY. IF SYSTEM HASN'T BEEN SERVICED WITHIN THE PAST TOUR OF DUTY [12 MONTHS] HIGHLY SUGGESTED TO HAVE SYSTEM INSPECTED, CLEANED, AND PURGED: NEW COOLANT INSTALLED INTO WARP DRIVE SYSTEM. [INSPECT HEAT EXCHANGE THERMOSTAT, AND REPLACE IF NOT OPERATING PROPERLY.]
- B. INSPECT WARP DRIVE INTERNAL LUBRICANT CONDITION, AND LEVEL. IF INTERNAL LUBRICANT [WARP OIL] IS LOW OBSERVE CONDITION AND TAKE NECESSARY ACTION: ADD AS NECESSARY, OR CHANGE WITH NEW LUBRICANT.
- C. OBSERVE REMAINING IMPORTANT FLUID LEVELS:
 - C1. NAVIGATION FLUID LEVEL. [STEERING POWER]
 - C2. TRANSPORT DRIVE TRANSMISSION FLUID. [ATF FL. LEVEL] [SHOULD BE BRIGHT RED IN COLOR NOT BROWN]
 - C3. TRANSPORT HYD. BRAKE SYSTEM FLUID LEVEL.
 - C4. INSPECT DRIVE BELTS, AND HOSES FOR FATIGUE. [REPLACE AS NECESSARY]

II. TRANSPORT VISUAL INSPECTION:

- A. INSPECT LANDING GEAR, AND FRICTION DEVICES FOR PROPER PRESSURES, BRAKING, BALANCE, AND ALIGNMENT.
- B. INSPECT LANDING LAMPS AND ASSOCIATED SAFETY EQUIPMENT.
- C. INSPECT COMMUNICATION EQUIPMENT IF INSTALLED: TELECOMMUNICATION VIA: CELL-TELL OR OTHER FEDERATION CHANNELS.
- D. INSPECT IN-CABIN SAFETY EQUIPMENT FOR PROPER FUNCTION. [IF NOT PROPERLY WORKING SEE ENGINEERING]

Filipino barbecued pork is probably the most popular menu item, and has been for four years.
