

## ENGINEERING REPORT By Brad McDonald

What a year! A new Trek movie. Hurricane Fran. 9 snowstorm, an ice storm, a new season of some old favorites on television and a number of new ones. Now, to cap it all off, I'm putting a 1200 square foot addition on the house! Lots of noise, dust, mess and half of the house is in disorder. (The other half is in boxes.) Depending on the timing, my next report may be a bit brief as I am doing much of the work myself.

As I had reported earlier, two Titanic projects were planned for this year. One has already surfaced, the miniseries on television. For a real Titanic enthusiast, this proved to be a major disappointment. With all the new information available, all this production managed to do was retell the same old story, repeat the same mistakes and myths. I'm really hoping the movie project being done by James Cameron will be much better.

On the subject of films, Star Trek: First Contact received mixed reviews from both critics (what do they know anyway) and fans. In a very unscientific method, I polled several fans in an exit poll. The results were not very surprising, but interesting anyway. Any fan of the original series was not impressed and generally gave the new movie an average of B-. One of the best points of the new movie was the Enterprise E. It was designed to look more like the "A" and it does. During the movie, Picard informs Lily that the ship is almost 700 meters long. If we assume a length of 690 meters, then use the conversion of one meter per 3.28 feet, then the new ship is approximately 2260 feet long. This makes is almost double the size of Enterprise A and even longer than the 2060 feet of the "E". In an interview on the Sci Fi Network, one production the designers of explained that the Engines on the "E" are the biggest ever on a Federation Starship. Of all the new features though, the new bridge is the best. Instead of the 'auditorium' of the "D", the "E" has a compact, efficient bridge, which is once again reminiscent of the "A".
