For this weekend, the meeting is the usual 4 p.m. at the Fisher house and we are going to cook out. We will furnish hot dogs and buns, the rest of the crew can bring chips, dip, ice, drinks, salads, snacks, side dishes, deserts, etc. Come and have a good time!

We have a lot to discuss about what we are going to do for the next year as we have had so many good ideas presented to us. But before we decide about some of those things I need to tell you about a couple of things that have happened since our last meeting.

Shortly after the July meeting, Barry Jackson called from California and gave me the name and phone number of Slanted Fedora Productions. I called the producer, Dave Scott, and we talked at length about bringing a convention to Raleigh. The end result is that Dave said he would try it! The convention is set for the weekend of July 17th and 18th, at the North Raleigh Hilton. The guests will be the Fab Four! I confirmed this August 30th, at 8 p.m.

As if that is not good enough, I went to Novacon 8 in D.C. in July and one of the dealers I have known for years tells me that Vulkon is coming to Raleigh the last weekend in January 1999! No one knows about it because Joe Motes just told him by phone less than thirty minutes earlier! So, when I get home, I call Joe Motes. We play phone tag for a month. Friday, August 28th, we connect and, yes, the information is correct and the

major guest is Robert Beltran (Chakotay), with Henry Darrow (Chakotay's father) and Mary Kay Adams (Grilka). Time and place: January 29-31, 1999, at the North Raleigh Hilton.

Both of these producers are willing to work with us on these conventions. We will need to put together a team to help produce panels, shows, etc. We want to do more than security. It will mean we need to recruit more people and everyone will have to do his or her share of work.

As a possible bonus, eleven of the crew were recruited to work the N.C. Sci Fi Expo, August 15th in Greensboro. This was Mike Smith's first effort at a convention and it had some hitches in it. But, Mike was flexible and allowed the Kitty Hawk to have free reign in solutions and everything worked out well. Mike said of the Kitty Hawk crew: "Best job I have seen anywhere". Anyway, he will likely do it again next year and might consider moving it to Raleigh.

A side note to the Greensboro convention: here is evidence, again, that you don't have to have a big con to have a good con. Mike had a really good dealer's room with dealers we have not seen before that had good selections and some bargains were to be had. Programming did suffer some but there was only the main stage, so everything had to occur there. Having multiple guests also is a big plus, and when one of them is like Grace Lee Whitney and signs autographs all day, you will have happy con-goers.

By the way, those who worked the con were given the opportunity to attend the guest dinner at a discounted price. Eight of us did go and I must report that the meal was perhaps the finest I have had at that type of occasion. The company was definitely first rate and the conversation interesting. There are always perks to be had at a good convention.

As for our choices of things to do for next year; we have several to discuss and I want everyone to think about them carefully.

It has been suggested that we work with the Special Olympics next summer as a crew.

We have talked about doing the Duke Radiothon for the entire 101.5 hours they are on the air.

Sponsoring a child to Space Camp has been discussed and has some possibilities for next year and succeeding years. Jack Hopkins can guide us on this one.

We have begun to plan a convention of our own, possibly for next year; and there is another convention on the planning stages for 1999 or 2000.

We have a wonderful web page up and running, thanks to Jeff Cohn, which need some fleshing out by department heads, and contributions from those of you who like to express yourselves.

Then you add in the usual conventions, parties, trips, summits, laser tag, etc, and you have a very full plate.

Think about all of these things and then express yourself at the upcoming meeting. Some of these can be done with less than the entire crew, but some will require **all** of us, and more, to be successful and fun.

We are entering a wonderful stage in the life of the Kitty Hawk. I hope each of you can participate to the fullest your lives will allow you and that you enjoy this period of growth and maturing. The convention opened at 10:00 a.m., with a long line, waiting to get in. Scheduled to appear were the Fab Four, James Doohan, Nichelle Nichols, Walter Koenig, and George Unfortunately, Jimmy Takei. Doohan cancelled his appearance due to other obligations, but did leave an autographed picture for everyone. Other guests included Anne Lockhart (June's daughter) and Herbert Jefferson of Battlestar Galactica, Beverly Washburn who appeared in Star Trek's The Deadly Years (she died in the show, of an old age disease, incidentally, Beverly blossomed into a real beauty), and Stephen Furst of Babylon 5.

Stephen Furst put up a real

comedy act, reliving his days of Animal House, with John Belushi. Annie and Herbert were telling their stories of Galactica, and there were dealer and memorabilia rooms to buy all sort of souvenirs such as autographed pictures, videos, comic books, and badges. A stunt team performed a demonstration of sword fighting, including Klingon swords, and, of course there was an auction.

The climax was when the Terrific Trio came in, George, Nichelle, and Walter. They mostly talked about Pittsburgh, how they were stranded there after appearing at a convention there. One flight was cancelled, another flight was delayed, and they were stranded

there overnight. They met all sorts of characters, and were in all sorts of weird situations while waiting for their flight.

After signing autographs, the trio appeared at the dinner, going from table to table talking with us. They again appeared on stage, this time as a solo, where George and Nichelle sang, and Walter read from his book, *Warped Factors*.

The next day, Sunday, was a repeat of Saturday, except the convention closed at six. I will admit, I had a great time here, I got to meet all three of the stars and get their autographs, and I picked up a few souvenirs.
