

Star Trek: Axanar By Diane Ripollone

From the Axanar Website: Axanar takes place 21 years before the events of Where no Man Has Gone Before, the first Kirk episode of the original Star Trek. Axanar is the story of Garth of Izar, the legendary Starfleet captain who is Captain Kirk's hero.

Definitely different, this is an independent film that raised money among the fans and Star Trek Stars. George Takei pledged \$200,000 to help the film reach its goals. The crowdfunding takes place at kickstarter. Conceived by Alec Peters who wrote the original episode that Garth of Izar appeared in, Peters wanted to do more than make a fan film. He wanted the film to look like a real production. To do this however he had get others to help and Gossett joined Christian project. Two stars play major roles in the production, Richard Hatch as Commander Kharn and Tony Todd as Admiral Ramirez.

As the project took form, fans from all over began to support the film by donating. As of today, they have raised \$638,000.00 for production. The Facebook page for the movie https://www. Facebook.com/StarTrekAxanar has over 40,000 likes. Seems it has caught the eye of many. Filming is to start in the Fall of 2014 and released Summer 2015. I know I'm looking forward to seeing the final movie.

Science ReportBy Elaine Pischke

In a report published in Science climatologists Ben Magazine, Marzeion, J. Graham Cogley, Kristin Richter and David Parkes, who have been studying glacial retreat, report that while human activity contributed to roughly 25% of glacial retreat for the period from 1851 to 2010, during the latter part of that time period, 1991 to 2010, human activity accounts for roughly 69% of glacial melting. Scientists believe that in recent years about 265 billion tons of ice melts each year due to human activity, as opposed to 130 tons due to natural causes. Since glacial response times are decades long, what we do today will take many years to be reflected in melting glacial ice.

By the time you read this, it may be headlines worldwide. British and Icelandic scientists are monitoring seismic and molten rock activity closely in anticipation of a possible major eruption of Icelandâs Askja volcano. Recent earthquakes in Iceland have raised the possibility of a major eruption. In 2010, a volcanic eruption in Iceland caused a disruption in air travel across Europe. In 1875, a major eruption of Mount Askia caused crop failures and killed livestock, causing a mass migration away from the area. When Mount Laki erupted in 1783, the eruption lasted eight months and the effects were felt around the world. The winters were colder for several years, crops failed across Europe and even into Egypt and

The China, causing famines. famines in Europe triggered mass immigration to the Americas. especially from Ireland and Scotland, and lit the fires for the French Revolution. The eruption caused over 6 million deaths worldwide. Benjamin Franklin noted a continuous dry fog that lay across the country, blocking out the sun, making the winter longer and colder, and the summer shorter and less bountiful. He correctly attributed the fog to an eruption in Iceland, although his records indicate he got the wrong mountain. The signs are there for another major eruption to happen soon. However, volcanos are notoriously difficult to predict. Stay tuned.

Computer Operations Report By John Troan

First, a "Welcome" to our newest members from the *Kitty Hawk*'s Computer Operations Department.

I've been watching the Crystal Coast Con web site for updates, especially for anything that mentions us. I just found that they've started their blog -- and they're bragging about us (and the Klingon banner we're bringing) at the top. (We're also in the con's Guest List with a copy of our full-color logo and a link back to our web site.)

In department news, I've gotten a <u>Facebook</u> page created for the <u>Kitty Hawk</u>. For those on Facebook, search for "Kitty Hawk" and our page should come up -- the full-color version of the

logo and the "StarFleet" in the organization title should make it easier to pick it out. I found out in August that "UNC-TV Volunteers" had a Facebook page and I decided it was time to create a nonprofit organization page for us and somehow use it as a platform for more people to know that we even exist. The Kitty Hawk's web site will still be our primary presence on the Internet and there's a link to it from our (new) Facebook page. All of the key updates will continue to be posted to our web site, but I'll be posting general Trek and space updates to FB as I see them on my personal FB feed.

The big project in Comp Ops is putting together the podcast from the individual recording sessions and mixing in the sound effects to make a richer listening experience. I played the teaser for my dad a couple weeks ago and he liked it, too. (He gets the blame for getting me started in *Trek*.)

As a promised follow up from the September meeting, here's where to get additional information on the headlines I had mentioned in the meeting:



- Techtonic activity discovered on Jupiter's moon Eupora
- <u>Curiosity</u> rover has reached Mount Sharp in the center of Mars' Endurance Crater
- Newest Orion capsule is ready to get fueled for the planned December test flight
- SpaceX's fourth cargo mission to the International Space Station

NASA recently made a major announcement with the awarding of contracts to use both SpaceX Crew Dragon (pictured above) and Boeing CST-100 capsules for transporting US crews to and from the space station. This will end NASA's need to use the Russian Soyuz to get to the station. Both contracts include a test flight with a NASA astronaut aboard to verify the whole system works, from launch to docking to return. Each company will then get between two and six launches for regular crew rotations. The capsules will also serve as the standard "lifeboat" for the crews they transport, which the Soyuz capsules also do for their respective crew transport missions.

Another recent news item from NASA is the creation of their new

NASA Solve web site. It's intended to be their focal point for getting public contributions for "solving tough problems related to NASA's mission through challenges, prize competitions, and crowdsourcing activities."

The first opportunity through Solve is the Mars Balance Mass Challenge, in which they're looking for ideas for turning what would normally be ballast (or dead weight) into a scientific or technological payload on future Mars landers. The stated prize pool is \$20,000 for winning ideas they develop further.

As I write this, NASA's latest mission to Mars is about twelve hours away from entering orbit around the planet. <u>MAVEN</u> will have a six-week test period before starting its primary mission: one (Earth) year of studying Mars' upper atmosphere.

In closing this month, I make note of the cover picture I chose for this issue -- the original U.S.S. Enterprise that started out all of *Trek*dom. September marks the 48th anniversary of the franchise's premiere. (This means we've got two years to plan the *Kitty Hawk*'s activities for *Star Trek*'s Golden Anniversary!)

Star Trek On-Line Gaming By Larry Cox

With the new "season" of STO starting soon, things have been a bit quiet in the Alpha quadrant recently. Players can go back and replay previous missions (options for easy, moderate and advanced plav are **Episodes** available). are available from prior seasons and can be replayed limitless times. These episodes have different missions dealing with a common theme, ie. The Klingon Romulan War. resettlement, and DS9, among others. Most episodes include

around 10 or so missions involving both space and ground combat set in various areas of the *Trek* galaxy. During replay of missions, players can change up Away Team members, ships and/or weapons used. A variety of ships are allowed for each player: tactical escort (*Defiant* class), Support Cruiser Retrofit (*Constitution* class), Long Range Science Vessel (*Intrepid* class), just to name a few. Different



components can lead to different outcomes.

Players can also develop missions for play, referred to a Foundry missions. Subject and theme for these can be as varied as the person developing it, with some having more story line and dialog then combat. After the completion of the mission the player has an opportunity to "rank" that mission. I've found many to be

quiet enjoyable and very *Trek* oriented while others have been rather silly or confusing. Players are able to search for foundry missions by a number of criteria like author, title and ranking, among others. Since many of these adventures are created by "die-hard" Trekkies/Trekkers many have a true ring to them. And these missions can take place in areas not used in other missions, such as Utopia Planitia and

Star Fleet Academy.
