The biggest event was our 25th Anniversary (of Commissioning) Dinner and Change of Command ceremony. The biggest "Thank You" went to — and continues to go to — JR and Jane Fisher for their (more than) 25 years of service to the *U.S.S. Kitty Hawk*, starting with establishing us as a shuttle in 1989.

To recap a few personnel announcements from that night:

- Larry Pischke continues as our First Officer (or XO)
- Brad McDonald is the new Second Officer
- Elaine Pischke will take over newsletter assembly and editing, starting in 2016.
- Diane Ripollone will be our "Social Media Officer", managing the Kitty Hawk's presence on all the various social media platforms. See <u>her</u> <u>update</u> on the progress of getting our on-line existence established.
- I will continue to manage the *Kitty Hawk* web site and e-mail distribution, plus the podcast work I've been doing (or trying to do).

The next event followed quickly thereafter – the 2015 Crystal Coast Con – which a few of us were able to attend. It

was great to reconnect with the Con folks we met last year. A very big "Thank You" William Simkiss for teaching Klingon Language class. From what we saw looking into the room, the class was a huge hit! Initial plans for the 2016 return are being thought through now, with more space and more time in mind. JR also brought back the Klingon banner, which made for tremendous photo ops with Bill Blair in full Klingon make up. (He looked terrific!)

One of the other headline guests was Tim Russ from *ST: Voyager*. By all accounts, he was a great speaker.

This is where I

was going to mention that UNC-TV's WinterFest is our next event, but the newsletter got delayed enough that WinterFest is now in our rearview mirror.

Now for the (ack!) administrative stuff.... First is my general approach to how I think I'll handle my CO duties (which will probably change as I get a better feel for this center seat and the ready room). Most matters will start with me getting opinions from the First and Second Officers. Depending on the particular matter at hand, (1) an announcement will be made; (2) more feedback will be gathered from the rest of the crew; or (3) a hybrid of the first two approaches will be done. (Most matters will be handled using approaches #2 and #3, so that the crew's opinions can help shape the matter as it goes forward.)



A good example of the third approach is the return of a rank and promotion system. As a first step to "returning to our roots" that Larry and I both "campaigned" on, I asked Larry and Brad what they thought about the idea (both liked it) and got some ideas back for how to proceed.

I haven't yet figured out all the details, but here's what has been determined so far:

- There will be a published point schedule for all activities. Attending Kitty Hawk meetings and maintaining StarFleet membership will have a small number of points. Since our mission is community service, those events will carry the most points.
- There will also be points awarded for ongoing *Kitty Hawk* responsibilities as they develop.

- A great question was asked about doing community service outside of KH-organized events. I liked the idea, and off-the-cuff suggested half points

 vs KH-organized service events.
- There will be two rank tracks enlisted and officers. StarFleet requires OTS (free through sfi.org) for being an officer. There's also an OCC requirement for Commander.
- Points earned on the enlisted track won't carry-over to the officer track, except.....
- There is a grace period to pass OTS and have the earned points carryover:
 - For new members, it'll be two months from their first StarFleet or Kitty Hawk activity.
 - For existing members, the grace period ends Jan 31, 2016, giving everyone a fair chance to have the points transfer as the rank and promotion system resumes – and has its shakedown cruise.
- Promotions will be on a graduated scale, such that it'll take an increasing total to reach each rank up the scale.
 (X points needed for Lt, j.g., X+Y points needed for Lt, maybe X+2Y points for Lt. Cdr, etc.) This will be published as well, so that everyone knows what's needed.
- Since I don't have a "historical log" of everyone's activities, the starting point will be the October meeting and dinner, which also lines up well with when I became CO.

These are just the broad strokes – yeah, these already are a lot of strokes – and I expect to make adjustments over time as this all develops.

I'll start tracking events and points with a basic spreadsheet, then (hopefully) eventually move to an on-line database.

Congratulations to Larry Cox and Keung Hui for passing OTS. The automatic promotions for completing OTS are forthcoming.

Going back to the "returning to our roots" theme, I'd like to start adding more community service groups and events to our calendar.

The first new project is collecting the hotel guest-sized bottles of shampoo,

In the July/August issue, I wrote a commentary about starting a new *Star Trek* T.V. series. Somebody must have read it, or at least part of it. It now looks like CBS (currently holding the rights to all Trek TV productions) will do just that. However, remember the scene in *Star Trek III* when Uhura admonishes 'Mr. Excitement' by saying be careful what you wish for, you may get it? Sorry gang, I apologize for wishing.

What we may get is totally different from what I had hoped for and I don't even know the basic premise or storyline yet. Instead of a practical or understandable approach of going directly to syndication or being part of a major network, we get a 'new marketing strategy' from CBS on a new service they call All Access. This is a subscription service which costs \$6.00 a month. CBS evidently figures it will give them a boost in subscriptions to have a new Star Trek series. Maybe it's the only reason for this series as CBS hasn't shown much interest otherwise. Unfortunately they ignored history; UPN tried to launch a network that way and it didn't work so well. At conventions I'd ask people about the New Star Trek series at the time and the standard reply was "Never seen it, we don't get UPN."

Now CBS wants us to pay for the 'privilege' of seeing a new series. It may not sound like much but my budget is already maxed out. No I won't pay! I'm already paying too much for electricity, gas, TV, phone, internet, city water and trash, yard care; not to mention home maintenance, repairs and so on. It has to stop. I've already cancelled most magazines, all newspapers and other items. I don't go out very much, rarely go to movies and I've even cut back on my book buying habit. Add to this, I'm approaching retirement and will soon be on a fixed budget with the ageassociated rise in medical expenses and... well you get the idea. Sorry CBS, you're out of luck, even if the series is worth watching. However...

The entire economic situation may be academic anyway as I'm not impressed with their announced line-up of producers and writers, most of who worked with 'Jar-Jar' Abrams. Guess you know my feelings about that. The press release states the new series will be unrelated to the current movies. Really? Then why bring in all the people associated with it? If the new series is set in the same alternate universe created by Abrams and his crew, then count me out! I'm not alone, I briefly read on line comments about the new series and the overwhelming opinion is: do not continue the Abrams universe, go back to the original series or Next Gen era. Perhaps a series could be set 75 years after Next Gen as Next Gen was set after The Original Series was set. As Spock was fond of saying, "There are always possibilities". Adhere to Roddenberry's original concept and forget big screen epics which may make studios happy, but is completely out of line of what Star Trek was all about. Put more science in the science fiction, new aliens and create morality plays based on current events. Less glamor. flashbangs, massive visual effects and so on as they are usually a distraction to hide a poor story. Keep the new show intimate with one hour stand-alone episodes; do not do continuous thread stories and turn it into another evening soap opera. A two-part, or even an occasional three-part story is okay, but shows that require seeing last week to know what is happening this week and what is happening next week are a real pain.

Anyway, I suppose time will tell, but I'm not optimistic. It's time to get off the soap box and back to work. Keep your fingers crossed!


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"All Good Things...."

He's barely responding, Doctor.

MCCOY

We must close him up! He's losing too much blood and we have nothing for transfusions.

NEW ANGLE

McCoy looks up at Spock and notices the bomb.

MCCOY

(working)

I hope that was worth the life of this boy Spock.

Spock is surprised by the statement.

SPOCK

No item is worth the life of a person, Doctor.

Now McCoy is surprised and softens his tone.

MCCOY

(working)

Let's close, Chapel.

(to Spock)

Then why remove the device? Scientific curiosity?

SPOCK

It was his only chance at life

McCoy is now feeling guilty as he's misjudged Spock.

CHAPEL

Closing complete, Doctor?

MCCOY

Yes, you can dress the wound now.

As Chapel works, McCoy turns back towards Spock.

MCCOY

(continuing)

Well, just don't sit there. Take us back to Enterprise!

NEW ANGLE

Spock looks surprised for a moment, then begins operating the shuttle controls.

MCCOY

(continuing)

And remember, I'm standing, so adjust your landing technique accordingly.

SPOCK

Understood.

ON MCCOY

He's working and smiling to himself, satisfied.

MCCOY

Save all of the patient's blood we've recovered. We

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may need to use it in a transfusion.

CHAPEL (O.C.) Is that... possible?

MCCOY

It may be his only chance, unless we can locate a Klingon donor.

ON SPOCK

He's concentrating on piloting the shuttle, making very cautious moves and activating communications.

> UHURA (V.O.) Go ahead, Mr. Spock.

> > **SPOCK**

Inform the Captain I have disarmed the device and we are returning to the ship.

INT. ENTERPRISE - BRIDGE -WIDE ANGLE

KIRK

Spock, how's the patient?

There's a bit of static, then:

MCCOY (V.O.)

Why don't you ask the doctor? Not great. Have a full emergency medical team waiting for me when we arrive!

Kirk turns to Uhura and gives her a nod. She activates her console.

UHURA

SICKBAY - SECURE AREA -WIDE ANGLE

Karn is in a diagnostic bed but we see security barriers and several N.D. SECURITY GUARDS in B.G. McCoy is immersed in checking Karn as Kirk enters.

> **KIRK** (moving)

Any progress?

McCoy doesn't look up, distracted and grim.

MCCOY

(working)

Not really.

Kirk takes a position next to McCoy, concerned.

KIRK

Will he recover, Bones?

MCCOY

(working)

Doubtful at this point.

KIRK

Why? What's wrong?

McCoy pushes past Kirk as Chapel enters with tricorder and hands it to McCoy.

MCCOY

(moving)

Just about everything.

McCoy studies the tricorder for a beat.

MCCOY

(continuing)

Just as I thought.

(to Kirk)

He probably won't make it,

Jim.

(beat)

Give me some time to come up with some... alternative ideas.

(afterthought)

Spock and Scotty wanted to see vou...

Kirk moves off quietly as McCoy becomes immersed in his work.

ENGINEERING LAB - WIDE **ANGLE**

They are examining the bomb with tricorders and other instruments as Kirk enters.

KIRK

(moving)

You wanted to see me, gentlemen?

Scott nods towards the bomb.

SCOTT

A nasty thing, sir. It could have done a lot of damage had it gone off on board the ship.

Kirk takes a position between Spock and Scott.

KIRK

Any specifics?

SCOTT

Definitely a Klingon design, sir.

SPOCK

Romulan But with а detonation device. Tell Mr. Chekov that his research was most useful.

Kirk smiles at the statement then turns to face Spock and Scott.

KIRK

Okay, so what do we have here, any ideas?

ON SPOCK

SPOCK

Several, Captain. Mr. Scott have already discussed a few possibilities.

(beat)

The Klingon could have been placed on the planet to be found by us. Since the planet's magnetic storms negated our transporter use...

ON SCOTT

SCOTT

...we had to use the shuttle. Using transporters would have revealed the device. It was a setup, sir.

THREE SHOT – KIRK, SPOCK AND SCOTT

SPOCK

If Dr. McCoy hadn't scanned the Klingon, we would have been in serious trouble.

SCOTT

A new Klingon tactic?

KIRK

That's what Command wants to know.

SCOTT

Maybe he was just marooned with the device as a means of taking his own life.

SPOCK

Perhaps he fell out of favor and this mission was his penance.

KIRK

Or punishment.

SPOCK

The possibilities are endless.

We see Kirk in thought for a moment, then:

KIRK

(indicating device)
Give me a complete read
out on that thing and we'll

forward the specifications to Command.

SCOTT

Already done, sir.

Scott smiles and hands a data tape to Kirk.

SPOCK

How is the Klingon, captain?

KIRK

Not very good. McCoy doesn't think he'll survive.

SPOCK

Most curious as Klingons are a very resilient people.

(beat)

Perhaps I can be of assistance.

Spock moves quickly to exit.

ON KIRK AND SCOTT

Both are surprised by his statement and quick exit.

Off their reactions...

CUT TO:

SICKBAY – TWO SHOT – KARN AND SPOCK

Karn is still unconscious in the diagnostic bed, N.D. security are in the B.G. Spock is standing close by and places his hand on Karn for a mind meld.

ON SPOCK

He's in a deep trance and we can see him react noticeably several times as if he's fighting some thoughts or images. After a few moments, he breaks free just as McCoy enters in B.G.

TWO SHOT - MCCOY AND SPOCK

McCoy notices Spock is uneasy and is concerned.

MCCOY What's wrong? Spock? Spock is still trying to recover mentally.

SPOCK

I was attempting to assist... with Vulcan self-healing methods.

McCoy checks the readouts above the bed.

MCCOY'S P.O.V.

The levels are rising slowly but steadily.

ON MCCOY

He's surprised and thrilled by the readings.

MCCOY

Spock, you've done it! He's--

McCoy notices Spock and studies him closely.

TWO SHOT - MCCOY AND SPOCK

McCoy supports Spock as he is unsteady.

MCCOY

Are you all right?

SPOCK

Many disturbing... images and thoughts...

Spock steadies himself, looks at Karn then turns back to McCoy, wide-eyed and disoriented.

SPOCK

(continuing)

He's... the son of... the Klingon Chancellor!

ON MCCOY

He's shocked and surprised.

Off his reaction...

FADE OUT.

The Movies:

For Star Trek II: The Wrath of Khan, the producers opted to go in a different direction with the look of Star Trek. This went all the way down to the way rank was indicated. What developed consisted of metal rank "bars" that pinned onto the uniform. This has the distinction of being the only system fully developed (with the exception ofFleet Captain) from Crewman Recruit to Fleet Admiral.

This system has been in use through all subsequent movies up to and including ST:VII with occasional appearances on Next Generation.






In succeeding Star Trek series, beginning with The Next Generation, a simpler method is used. Small round rank "pips" are placed on the right collar. From Lieutenant (jg) to Captain this system is pretty clearly defined in various episodes. However, above and below that it could get rather contradictory from time to time.

Although in some early episodes the rank pips appear silver, for STARFLEET purposes Commissioned Officer ranks are considered to be gold pips. Silver pips are used to indicate Enlisted grades.

Flag officers in the Next Generation have had little to no consistency. Thus our designations are more speculative based on the style shown in later seasons.
