Medical Report By Amy DeJongh

With Hurricane Isabel leaving our midst and a few weeks of hurricane season left, now if the perfect time to create, update, or restock your personal first aid kit. Basic contents should be –

- first-aid manual
- sterile gauze
- · adhesive tape
- adhesive bandages in several sizes
- elastic bandage
- antiseptic wipes
- soap
- antibiotic cream (triple-antibiotic ointment)
- antiseptic solution (like hydrogen peroxide)
- hydrocortisone cream (1%)
- acetaminophen and aspirin (aspirin is

not recommended for children under age 12)

- extra prescription medications (if the family is going on vacation or if a disaster is imminent.)
- tweezers
- sharp scissors
- safety pins
- disposable instant cold packs
- calamine lotion
- alcohol wipes or ethyl alcohol
- thermometer
- plastic gloves (at least 2 pairs)
- flashlight and extra batteries
- mouthpiece for administering CPR (can be obtained from your local Red Cross)

- your list of emergency phone numbers
- blanket (stored nearby)

Choose containers for your kits that are roomy, durable, easy to carry, and simple to open. Plastic tackle boxes or containers for storing art supplies are ideal, since they are lightweight, have handles, and offer a lot of space.

After you have stocked your first aid kits, be certain to read the entire first aid manual so you'll understand how to use the contents of your kits. (If your children are old enough to understand, review with them as well.) Store first-aid kits in places that are out of children's reach but easily accessible for adults. And lastly, check the kits regularly. Replace missing items or those that may have become outdated.


On DVD, the second installment of the *Ring* trilogy is available in both standard two-disc format and a deluxe four disc set. *Sleeping Beauty*, Disney's classic from 1959 has been released in a deluxe edition with lots of behind the scenes extras. A personal favorite of mine is the 1953 *Titanic*. Yes it's black and white, but this is where Cameron got his rich girl meets poor boy on a doomed liner story. It's more faithful to what really happened and holds up well. The DVD had lots of extras, including three documentaries on production and the sinking of the *Titanic*.

Of major concern, is the recent power throughout the northeast. failure According to the engineering associations and professional organizations in our country, it's just a symptom of many things that need working on. For instance, the overall investment in energy transmission was \$2 billion in 2000, down from \$5 billion in 1975, yet demand has increased steadily. More important though, this just a tip of the iceberg. Nearly every facet of our infrastructure needs attention, even more so since this alarm was sounded over ten years ago. The great interstate highway system was started when I was just a kid, now It needs repair and some serious work. It's estimated that \$1.6 trillion is needed over a 5 year period to get the job done. A 6-cent a gallon national tax has been proposed to help pay for the work which includes water treatment and transport, sewage treatment and transport, bridges, dams. tunnels, roads and other structures. Boy talk about job security, construction projects for the next ten vears!

Ford now offers a PZEV (Partial Zero Emissions Vehicle). It's a special version of their Focus model, but at now additional charge. Ford execs are eating the additional costs in hopes the car will catch on. It's not a fancy hybrid, just good old Yankee ingenuity. It's an honest effort by U.S. auto makers to show the "other guys" they still know how to get things done. It's on a par with foreign PZEV's, costs \$13,385 to \$14,915 and it's made in the USA. (For all the foreign car snobs in our midst, J.D. Power himself drives a Ford, so there!)

NASA update, it now looks like it's going to be way into next year before shuttle flights can resume. Originally, NASA was hoping for action this winter, now spring or summer launches look doubtful. It seems there is a lot more involved than just in-flight repair kits and prevention of falling foam. Word is, a major overhaul of the way NASA operates is being looked at, by the people that hold the purse strings, namely Congress.
